SCHOOL OVERVIEW

Oakwood School is a multi-campus, non-government, coeducational day school founded on Christian values and established to serve the Plymouth Brethren community. The School is registered to operate in Tasmania, with a current enrolment of 140 students from Years 3 to 12.

Our mission is to ensure that our students develop the understanding, skills, knowledge and attitudes which are not only compatible with their beliefs but that will also enable them to fulfill their potential, be self-directed life-long learners, proactive in achieving life goals and contribute in significant ways to their community, the Australian community and the global community. The School strives to provide a vibrant and stimulating learning environment where the students feel safe and secure. Students are recognised as maturing young men and women, able to make sincere judgments about the world around them, and their place in it. Oakwood's motto is 'Learning to Learn' and the School has adopted a Learning to Learn framework, the intention of which is to develop Self Directed Learners; young people with the drive, skills and capabilities to be effective and enthusiastic life-long learners. The School is committed to creating and delivering learning programs that meet the educational needs of each individual student and to nurture the attitudes and skills necessary for positive character development, service and personal growth throughout life.

Oakwood School is a member of a world-wide group of schools known as OneSchool. As such, Oakwood offers every student the opportunity to achieve not only the Tasmanian Certificate of Education and an ATAR but the OneSchool Graduate Aims:

- + To become a positive contributor to community, family and workplace;
- + To become self-directed life-long learners;
- + To explore and develop personal potential;
- + To gain employability skills;

MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Oakwood School started the year with Mrs Stuart as our Acting District Principal and Campus Site Coordinator (Launceston). Our Regional Principal Mr Damien Barry was a regular visitor to Oakwood in 2018 and on his second visit to our school in Term 1 he visited the Hobart, Devonport and Launceston sites. He also joined in the fun at our State Athletics Carnival held in Launceston. We always look forward to his visits and updates on all things OneSchool.





The STEAM Challenge & Photo Day was an amazing success with the photos turning out beautifully, despite the thunderstorms during the whole school photo taken at the Elphin Sports Centre. The STEAM challenges also went off with a 'bang' with students and staff contributing to a very enjoyable day. Students came up with some brilliant designs and prototypes and the staff tested them with just as much enthusiasm.

On Monday, March 19 the whole School gathered together over VC to celebrate the success of our Class of 2017 at our Dux of School Assembly. There were some amazing results and these were published in the March OneSchool Gazette.

A special congratulations to Caitlin Cruickshank who achieved an ATAR of 99.1 and was the first Oakwood student to achieve a ranking in the top 100 students for the State!







On Thursday 8th March all year 7-12 students met at the Launceston Site to participate in the VC Classes Day and the Elevate Study Skills Program. This was a great day of learning and an opportunity for students and staff to enjoy face to face lessons whilst exploring the Virtual Classroom experience.

During Term I our Primary students headed to Hobart on a two day excursion including an exciting day trip to Port Arthur, the Athletics Carnival occurred on Friday I3th April and student Interim Reports were sent home at the end of term.



The amalgamation of the Devonport and Launceston Campuses was a key focus throughout 2018 with regular updates on the renovation keeping us in anticipation. In Week 4 of Term 3 builders started demolition works at 10 Techno Park, surveying got underway for carpark alterations and various trades were awarded work packages for the refit. In late 2018 the big move to the new campus in Techno Park took place via the combined and gracious efforts of staff, students and community.

I am very thankful for these collaborative efforts and it was testament to the wonderful way in which we work as one to achieve significant goals.



On Monday 26th March Year 9/10 students from Launceston and Hobart Site attended a photography workshop at the Hobart Site. The students had a great day and learned how to work with aperture, depth of field, saturation and colours and experimented with taking photos from a 'birds eye view' or a 'worms eye view'.









The students had a lot of fun experimenting with their cameras while exploring the grounds and foreshore of the Oakwood Hobart Site. At the end of the day they chose five of their best photos to submit into the Moran Photographic competition.





I started as Acting District Principal at the beginning of Term 2 and went on to become our District Principal and Head of Launceston Campus. An excerpt from my first article can be found below:

"It has been a great pleasure joining the team at Oakwood School Tasmania. I have had the privilege of meeting many of the students and all staff at each Campus and have found an open hearted and vibrant community. Having moved from Sydney it is so refreshing to travel around Tasmania and find a level of openness and trust in the people in this state. The kind hospitality, generosity of spirit and wonderful valuescentred living that I have seen is so encouraging and one of the key contributors to my decision to move to Tasmania. These lovely characteristics are magnified in our students and staff at Oakwood and whilst it has been a busy start I feel in many positive ways that I have been here for a great deal longer than two weeks."

We ran the *I am 4 Zero* course for Years 10, 11 and 12 in Term 2. This is a program designed and developed for young drivers promoting safe driving behaviour. Our staff, students and families were involved in this course with the parent/community section being delivered via Zoom webinar.

On the 30th May the Devonport and Launceston Primary excursion took place with students visiting the Launceston Museum. Our fundraising events: Silly Sock Day and the SLT Biggest Morning Tea; and our Team Achievers Conference 2018 for all 10-12s at Launceston Site created many opportunities for the Student Leadership Team (SLT) to show initiative and leadership.





The final few weeks of Term 2 were a combination of academic rigor and co-curricular excellence. These events included the 7-12 Exams and MAP Testing which were combined this semester and our Heart Foundation 'Jump Off' Primary Assembly with Parents & Community enjoying this activity.

The Semester One Reports were distributed and we had a superb display of teamwork and skill at the Lightning Carnival.

In the first week of Term 3 our 2019 Year 11 and 12 students completed their Pathway Planning Meetings on each campus with their Parents, Head of Campus and District Principal to discuss their subject choices and pathways. The result of this was that all students were able to do the courses they had requested.

Mrs Vanessa Harvey accepted a state government position within the disabilities sector at the end of Term 3 and resigned from her position as Head of Primary and Learning Development at Oakwood School. We are very thankful for her wonderful contributions in the roles that she had whilst she was at Oakwood.

Term 3 started with our focus on Care and Compassion as one of our core values. Students have been focusing on showing kindness, consideration and generosity to all. This was brought into clear focus on the excursion to Melbourne when Year 9 and 10 students from all Campuses visited the Holocaust Museum and got to hear Joe, a survivor of the concentration camps in Poland, speak of three German soldiers who showed him compassion and kindness when they could have lost their lives for doing so. Our students covered a great deal of ground on the day and they took only their best behaviour and left nothing but an excellent impression.







Multicultural Day was an excellent focus allowing for collaboration, teamwork and inspiring cooking. So much was gained from this event and it resulted in great community warmth and focus. Congratulations went to all teams for their fantastic efforts and flexibility. The funds raised from the raffle held on the day made a contribution to helping the Australian farming community affected by the drought. The leadership, motivation and focus shown by our senior students in the organisation of the Multicultural Day was obviously applied to their academic work and resulted in wonderful results across these years.

The National debate was held via zoom on September 12 with Victoria Chugg, Danyon Saunders, Logan Churchman & Imogen Cruickshank representing us commendably. They were coached by Mrs Amanda Pitt who organised all of the lead up debates and coordinated the debating preparations.

The Oakwood School Primary successfully completed their swimming program and as usual staff, admin and parents helped make this program run smoothly with transport and organisation. We could not achieve what we achieve without this generous support and I know we all really appreciate the way our school community functions as a whole to get things done.





We had a number of activities in the final week of Term 3 and students and staff enjoyed the changes to routine. Year 12 Graduation Celebration was a wonderful occasion thanks to the generous attitude and service of our Year 10 and 11 students.





This term provided a rich variety of learning experiences for both staff and students. Staff engaged a great deal with courses run at the Teaching Academy at The Precinct, Sydney and around the nation. This increased input from professionals centred around our five Oneschool Pillars and saw new thinking and benefits in the areas of Digital Tech Pedagogy, Learning Centre Coaching, SDL programming, Differentiation in the Primary Curriculum and Learning Support.

The different approaches and ideas that were implemented as a result benefited students, making a visible difference to their learning environments and at times totally transformed the lessons and studies they undertook.

Teachers and students were committed and gained a great deal from the National Debating Competition whilst preparing for the Profile of the Art Day and getting fit for the Cross Country Colour Run. The final two weeks of term were highly engaging and enjoyable as students and staff put their all into their work and co-curricular activities.

Term 4 started on Monday October 15 with a focus on OneSchool's five Core Values. These sit at the top of our School's global strategy and are inextricably tied into our Vision. In fact, ensuring our school community understand our values and live by them, is one of the foundational pillars of our strategy. OneSchool Tasmania work consistently to embed these values into the day-to-day life of the school. To increase awareness and provide our students with an opportunity to engage with the values we participated in the OneSchool Global Values Competition.





The five OneSchool values we presented on were:

- 1. Respect for all people, property, opinions and authority.
- 2. Responsibility for our actions, progress and the environment.
- 3. Integrity uprightness, honesty and decorous conduct, governed by the Holy Bible.
- 4. Care & Compassion kindness, consideration and generosity to all.
- 5. Commitment to self-discipline and the pursuit of excellence.

Renovations continued in Hobart with a dedicated team sorting, tidying & cleaning the MDT room, painting the library and moving out lots of old books, painting & carpeting the old 11/12 Room and moving the staff room. They also set up the new 11/12 Room, installed new sliding doors in the locker area, cleaned out the sports store, removed the hedge in the secondary play area and marked out where the cricket pitch could go.

Mr Steve Foskett finished up with Oakwood at the end of 2018 as Head of Department – Science. He made brilliant contributions in the e-Learning area, developing our 7-10 Science CANVAS courses and achieved superb results with his Chemistry students in particular. He is currently working on a project in Asia involving the immersive education department attached to a new multimillion dollar multimedia theme park.

New staff were welcomed with Ms Mary Duggan starting in the role of Director of Studies and Mrs Zohra Saleem in the role of Admin Assistant (Hobart) and Accounts These staff provided the final roles in our new teaching and admin staff structures.

Year 7-10 exams and final topic tests for the year bought the academic year to a close.

It was an absolute pleasure to meet our new Year 3's and their parents as they enjoyed time with their peers and new teachers. Year 6 also participated in a very successful day with their new teachers as they sampled a day in the life of a Year 7 student.

Our final week started with our Primary Year 6 Graduation Assembly with family and community present to celebrate the first four years of our Year 6 students' time at Oakwood.







Year II students travelled to Hollybank for two days of team building and leadership skills. On the final Friday of Term 4 we all came together at the Tailrace Function Centre for our Annual Presentation Day to acknowledge and celebrate our student's achievements with parents, staff, families and community members.

We finished 2018 with a view to the future, the anticipation of newly refurbished and recreated Campuses and the promise of a new name to match – OneSchool Global Tasmania.

STUDENT ENROLMENT

STUDENT ATTENDANCE

Students are required by law to attend school on every day of the school year. If a student is sick, the school should be contacted by 9.00am on the morning of the illness, otherwise we will contact the parent. A note is expected to be provided in the diary when they return to school. Students can be exempted from attending given an explained absence where a genuine reason is provided which is acceptable to the school. Unexplained or unapproved absences are required by law to be reported to the Education Department when their set limit is reached.





RECORDING ATTENDANCE:

The official record of attendance is taken once a day online by staff in morning roll call, through Sentral, our School Management System. Admin Staff monitor this process each day and ensure all rolls are completed by 9am. Teachers also take a period by period attendance for each class they teach to allow the School to keep track of each student's attendance throughout the day. Full Day, Part Day, explained and unexplained absences are formally reported to parents on Academic Semester Reports.

SENIOR SECONDARY OUTCOMES

In 2018, all our Year 12 students achieved a Tasmanian Certificate of Education (TCE) (100%), 84% of students achieved an ATAR score and 6 students achieved an ATAR over 90. 32% of students aiming for an ATAR achieved 90+, whilst 50% of ATAR students achieved above 70. This is a fantastic result and we commend our teachers for the excellent work they have done in assisting students to achieve these grades. We would also like to thank parents and family for their support and encouragement.

Post - School Destinations

Due to strong partnerships with business communities through our work placement programs, all students upon leaving school have obtained full time or part time employment. Many students have gained valued experiences in workplaces whist working toward VET units of study which are sought after by employers.

Oakwood School promotes continual learning and personal growth throughout life as aspired to in our motto "Learning to Learn". Some of our 2018 graduates have enrolled in a tertiary course this year and all are employed.
