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A Message from the District Principal

The 2020 school year commenced with our traditional Dux Assembly in which we celebrated the of the class of 2019. As a community we were proud of the efforts and achievements of all our graduates and commencing the year celebrating the successes of the class of 2019 provided all students with aspirations for their own successes. Our excellent results from the 2019 cohort were no doubt a reflection of the self-directed learning skills developed throughout their entire journey at OneSchool Global Tasmania.

2020 however, proved to be a year unlike any other. The global COVID19 pandemic changed the way we lived our lives but importantly for us as a school, it affirmed our self-directed approach to schooling and our utilisation of technology as a central tool for education.

The first part of the year saw staff continuing to focus on their use of our digital platforms including Zoom and Canvas. Students continued to focus on creating productive learning environments that promoted and developed the self-directed learning of all. This focus on our core business and approach to education proved extremely valuable with the looming Coronavirus pandemic.

Unfortunately, Term 1 concluded with staff and students working in lockdown.

Staff and students returned to Term 2 in the middle of the COVID 19 lockdown. The social isolation of the pandemic certainly proved to be a challenge. However, through the school's investment in self-directed learning skills and the embedded technologies, our students were able to maintain a continuity of learning that helped to ensure their continual academic success. This period of remote learning affirmed our innovative approach to education is a model that works, and it was pleasing to see students continue to progress in their academic achievement and achieve substantial levels of growth, as evident in the students MAP data. When other campuses across the globe remained in various forms of lock down, we were fortunate that we could welcome staff and students back to campuses part way through Term 2. While life hadn't returned to normality in Tasmania, the return of students back into physical classrooms provided a sense of assurance for all.

Term 3 provided more of a sense of normality with cross campus travel resuming along with other whole school events such as the State Lighting Carnival. Our organisation continued to develop its national connections through its involvement in the National Public Speaking Competition and staff engagement in course design and the building of Canvas templates.

The final term of the year brought with it all the usual busyness as students completed their studies and learning programs. We were extremely fortunate and grateful to be able to host our Recognition of Excellence Ceremony largely as normal. This celebration also incorporated the amazing artwork completed by students over the course of the year and our Multi-Purpose Room became a gallery filled with stunning, creative pieces of art. It was the first time that many members of the community had been able to see each other since the lockdown and for me it was a delight to meet our extended school community and visually see the commitment everyone has to the children's education.

Throughout the year there were a number of staffing changes which allowed us as an organisation to develop a more sustainable structure moving into the future. Ms Mary Dugan resigned as the Director of Studies and Mr Andrew Small, District Principal also left us. As a result of these resignations and the maturity of our organisation a decision was made to merge these roles.

These changes help to ensure that the teaching and learning program is the main driver for continuous school improvement. We were also able to support a number of staff in transitioning from provisional to full registration a process which shows our commitment to continuing to developing the capacity of our teachers.

The year concluded with the professional staff spending time planning and establishing goals for the 2021 academic year. The 5 focus areas developed in consultation with students, parents and the wider community were:

- 1. Delivery of a Self-Directed Learning Conference for students
- 2. Improving Literacy
- 3. Improving public speaking skills
- 4. Developing greater differentiation in our assignment designs
- 5. Driving results

Finally, we would like to thank all members of our school and community for their continued support, especially in a unique and challenging year.

Contextual information about the school



Originally known as Oakwood School, OneSchool Global Tasmania is a non-government, coeducational day school founded on Christian values and established to serve the Plymouth Brethren community. The School is registered to operate in Tasmania, with an enrolment of 118 students from Years 3 to 12 attending Campuses situated in Hobart and Launceston.

OneSchool Global TAS is a member of a world-wide group of schools, namely OneSchool Global, one of the world's largest and most comprehensive, truly global schools. Together we develop learners who "learn how to learn" through a forward looking and pioneering approach to education. While academic excellence has and always will be a priority, OneSchool challenges dated educational practices and processes with our Self-Directed Learning program. We place the focus on what and how students are learning, rather than merely on what is being taught.



The Hobart Campus was established in 1994 and has grown from its small beginnings in a converted two-storey house to our current premises set on the water's edge in Windermere Bay.


The original Launceston Campus commenced in 1995 with only secondary school students and expanded in 2007 to provide for students from Years 3 through to 12. In 2019, we opened the doors of our new Campus situated in Kings Meadows – a former call centre completely transformed into a vibrant and modern, state-of-the-art learning environment.

Enrolment at OneSchool Global TAS is open to the children of all Plymouth Brethren families and children of families who are willing and able to support the ethos of the School. 

MAP Growth Testing

At OneSchool Global, we use external, standardised tests known as Measure of Academic Progress (MAP) Growth Tests to measure student growth in Language, Reading and Numeracy at regular intervals (three terms per year). We use this information to inform goal setting with students and adjust teacher practice. For more information on MAP Growth Testing, visit https://www.nwea.org/map-growth/.

Over the 2020 year our students performed exceptionally well considering there was a period of time where students continued their learning from home, during part of the COVID lockdown period in Tasmania.

The below table shows the percentage of Year 7-11 students in the 'average' or 'above' classification according to the MAP data we obtained at the close of 2020:

Year 12 students were not tested in the last half of the year.

Senior Secondary Outcomes

The results obtained by the class of 2020 show a high achievement within all subject areas. All (100%) of our graduating students received a Tasmanian Certificated of Education (TCE), 46% received an ATAR above 70, and 33% achieved an ATAR above 80. Our top performing student – Dux of School – achieved an ATAR of 94.75.






